

CNS provided funds for programs and agencies within our focus areas, which include veterans, community preparedness, and education, and also contributed to community causes and special needs.



Pantalexans and their families teamed up with the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 430 to pack 35 care boxes for military troops.



CNS donated \$10,000 to the Bushland Independent School District to expand its hands-on, high-tech science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) programs.

In Amarillo and Oak Ridge, the Pantex and Y-12 Community Investment Funds provided financial assistance to deserving nonprofit organizations and educational institutions through a competitive grant process.

In 2017, CNS and its employees raised funds and provided volunteer hours for numerous causes—from Pantexans and their families teaming with the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 430 to pack care boxes for military troops to Y-12 volunteers providing manpower to maintain areas of Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

CNS Day of Volunteering

The Day of Volunteering is an opportunity for employees to help local nonprofit organizations with specific needs. CNS covers the cost of materials, and employees provide the manpower. This year 16 teams from Pantex and 18 teams from Y-12 rehabilitated old properties, painted neglected interiors, spread mulch, and cleared outdoor areas at nonprofit organizations in Texas and Tennessee.

United Way

At Pantex and Y-12, employee and corporate giving generated \$1.4 million for the United Way in the Texas Panhandle and East Tennessee in 2017. The campaigns also added more than 500 Leadership Givers, who each pledged donations of \$1,000 or more. Corporate gifts totaled \$150,000 at the two sites.

Educational Outreach – Preparing the Workforce of the Future


CNS educational outreach activities focused on STEM and additive manufacturing programs in 2017. From mentoring middle-and-high-school robotics teams and collaborating on a high school manufacturing skills academy, to supporting the activities surrounding science bowls, CNS knows education is key to preparing our future workforce.

CNS plays an active role in strengthening the quality of FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) Robotics Competitions for teams of high school students in Texas and Tennessee. Students compete head-to-head on a special playing field with robots they design, build, and program. This year, CNS provided supplies for school teams in local and national competitions. CNS employee volunteers also served as team mentors.



The innovative Dream it. Do It. program is in its second year in East Tennessee. CNS teamed with the Anderson County Chamber of Commerce and Roane State Community College. The program pairs eighth-grade students with area industries to create videos of the manufacturing process.


CNS continues to be involved in science bowl competitions, both with monetary contributions and employee volunteers. In Amarillo, the Pantex Science Bowl is the premier educational event, sponsored solely by CNS. Hundreds of Pantex employees offer their expertise to help both local high school and middle school teams.



During Engineers Week, students visited the exhibits at New Hope Center History Museum. The activity was part of a job shadow experience that allowed students to step outside the traditional classroom to see the many paths they can pursue in an engineering career.



CNS hosted more than 100 high school girls at this year's Introduce a Girl to Engineering at Y-12. The daylong event showcased the importance and diversity of engineering careers and allowed the students to participate in hands-on experiments and activities. The program debuts at Pantex in 2018.



In 2017, Amarillo High School competed on the national level at the U.S. Department of Energy National Science Bowl in Washington, D.C. The winner of the Pantex Regional High School Science Bowl defeated 29 other teams from the Texas Panhandle to reach the nation's capital.

CNS Is Reaching Out and Touching Lives

Through collaborations with our trade unions, colleges, universities, and schools, CNS encourages students to consider careers in trades and crafts in addition to engineering and other technical fields.



CNS continued its support of Junior Achievement in Amarillo and Oak Ridge in 2017. Through financial contributions and volunteers, our goal is to increase awareness and excitement of business and economics in young people, so they might consider professional, craft, and trade careers.



Pantex engineers teamed up with the Amarillo chapter of Texas Alliance for Minorities in Engineering to help make the Don Harrington Discovery Center's Catapult Challenge a flying success. Students in fifth through twelfth grades tested their engineering skills and knowledge of math and science as they designed and constructed a catapult to hurl a tennis ball.



Students from Norwood Middle School participated in job shadowing with several Y-12 employees on Groundhog Day. They included security police officers, firemen, the Atomic Trades and Labor Council president, and the chief steward of pipefitters.
